



Dear Friends,

I am so grateful for your ongoing and generous support of the Peace House mission to end interpersonal violence and abuse. We are so grateful for this community. Thank you to the steadfast leadership of our Board of Directors and to our dedicated and compassionate staff and volunteer's.

Earlier this year I was watching a family in our courtyard through the window. A preschool-age child rode a tricycle around the path while their sister was being helped by her mother to learn to ride a big bike for what looked like the first time. Her mother stayed by the little girl's side, helping her keep her balance, and encouraging her along the way. She was clearly communicating: "You can do this, you've got this!" There was some fear and hesitation but then a smile appeared on her daughter's face. I watched as she found her independence and delightedly peddled away on her own.

I could not help but think of the scene as a perfect analogy of what we do here at Peace House. Our staff and volunteers, our board and our community, and you - the person reading this - are standing next to that mother as she is standing next to her child. We are helping her stay balanced and encouraging her along the way as she pursues the daunting and hopeful path to rebuilding a life free from violence.

Interpersonal violence is tragically common in our neighborhoods. During the 2023 fiscal year, 193 women, men, and children stayed at our community campus and another 300 people living in the community engaged in Peace House services. The need for victim services continues to grow in our service area and we are committed to reaching any families affected by abuse in our community. Last year, we saw a 41% increase in survivors accessing Peace House services.

More survivors of sexual assault are seeking help at Peace House since the addition of specialized sexual assault services. Reporting sexual violence can be a terrifying process. Peace House advocates are certified rape crisis counselors legally obligated to confidentiality and able to connect victims to relevant services. Advocates can offer support by remaining by the victim's side before, during, and after the medical exam to explain procedures, answer questions, and advocate for the victim. Our hope is for increased community awareness of organizations like Peace House that are available and trained to support in the wake of sexual violence.

Peace House has many years of experience and expertise in providing adult survivors

with the resources needed to break the cycle of abuse. But the youngest victims of violence - children - need added and different resources to recover from abuse. From therapy to child-centric safety planning, education, and activities, Peace House looks to 2024 as the year we develop programming that better supports the youngest souls living on our campus and in our community. The new program will provide a safe, trauma-informed space for children who have witnessed or experienced interpersonal violence to heal, express their feelings, develop conflict resolution skills, and play, with the intent of stabilizing and reinstituting a sense of normalcy in their daily lives. We warmly invite you to visit the campus and tour the newly renovated children's space to learn more about the new program.

We can't end violence and abuse in our community without you. We are deeply appreciative of the gift of your time, talent, and financial resources. We hope you continue to support survivors and share the Peace House mission. Together we are creating a safer community and a more peaceful future.

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## SEXUAL ASSAULT SERVICES

Peace House has long been known for our resources for survivors of domestic violence. Recently, we expanded our mission to include sexual assault services too.

We can help whether the abuse is recent or historic and encourage individuals to reach out if they have any questions at all.

Sexual assault survivors who seek support at Peace House or at the Park City Hospital are met by a community-based advocate who offers crisis intervention and support while interacting with law enforcement and a sexual assault nurse examiner.





This program aims to support survivors of sexual violence both within and outside the context of domestic violence.



Sexual assault can happen to anyone. Survivors may be youth or adults, both male and female, and of varying backgrounds.



Peace House advocates specialize in supporting survivors with a focus on restoring choice, dignity, and respect as they navigate the aftermath of trauma.

### PREVENTION EDUCATION

Peace House dispatches skilled prevention educators to businesses, organizations, events, and classrooms across Summit and Wasatch counties. Educators equip students with age-appropriate resources on fostering healthy relationships and combating interpersonal violence.

### **SUPPORTIVE SERVICES**

Peace House made significant strides in service delivery — such as legal advocacy: including information, referrals, court accompaniment, and protective order support. Case managers and therapists strengthened the safety and resilience of survivors by fostering their emotional wellbeing and offering crucial resources to rebuild their lives.

In addition to the hospital response team, Peace House provided a range of sexual assault services including legal advocacy, case management, therapy, and advocacy.
